Staff clothing to promote importance to children of having a sports kit in school and promoting exercise (across federation)		Children to be given endless opportunities through sport to build teamwork skills as well as perseverance in the face of challenge. Teach children to celebrate each other's successes and promote positivity and inclusiveness to all participating. Children to compete in their team's colours. Sports Day is a celebrated event throughout the whole school. Children will have a positive mental outlook around the importance of exercise on both their physical and mental health. PE kits will be present more in school, and children will see their adults in school as positive role models and appreciate they are ready for PE alongside the children.	Attendance was consistent and children spoke highly of outside agencies who delivered. Team games through our new PE scheme has seen a increase of team game opportunities within lessons to promote these key skills. Will continue with this next year and build in more inter school competitions to further progress this. A large % of children always have a PE kit in school and often are excited when their adult was in theirs, knowing it was their PE day!

Planning shows clear progression from the introduction of a new skill to putting this into practise in game-based activities. PE lead will be able to share findings with all teaching staff that are relevant to school, and offer support to those teachers who would like support to upskill their knowledge and teaching in preparation for Ofsted.	As mentioned above, PE passport was hard to navigate and differentiation for EYFS was not suitable to use. Wanting clear progression of skills, we have decided to change programme next year. All staff have been confident in their delivery of PE this year. Progression of skills document shared with all to ensure they are aware of the expectations by the end of the unit for all year groups.
